The network is coordinated at the Institut de Veille Sanitaire (InVS), France, and is financially supported by the European Commission (DG-SANCO). EuroTB aims to improve the contribution of surveillance to tuberculosis control in the WHO European region, through the provision of valid, comparable epidemiological information on tuberculosis.
